
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Background

The Obstetrics Clerking Sheet provides information about a patient's history at a glance. These data comprises of Last Menstrual Period, Estimated Due Date, Lab Results, First Trimester Screening and Risk Factors. Page 2 is often inadequately filled up for various reasons. An incomplete clerking sheet leads to patient safety issues, for example, unknown antenatal investigations during Citrix downtime.


Aim


To ensure 100% of all sections on Page 2 completed by the 4th antenatal visit in subsidized patients.



Results

incident reminder how a patient care is compromised due to incomplete clerking



"A recent incident, a 28 year old G2P1 who booked at 20 weeks gestation was seen and clerked, however her antenatal clerking sheet was not completed. At 34 weeks gestation, when she was asked she said that she was rhesus negative. An immediate blood grouping was done for her which confirmed rhesus negative status. The patient had to wait for a few hours for the results and get her rhogam."

Conclusion

to lack of time

The importance of a completed clerking sheet cannot be overemphasized, especially for subsidized patients under team care. Doctors rely on the clerking sheets everyday. It is our duty to ensure complete clerking. Incomplete clerking can lead to a patient's care being compromised. In busy work settings, constant reminders are needed to remind each other to do more for patient safety.
